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GROWING FAMILY THERAPY

There is a growing need for programs to support adolescents experiencing substance abuse issues. To help meet this need, we are expanding our reach by enhancing existing programs. The Multidimensional Family Therapy (MDFT) program is an innovative drug use recovery service for adolescents and their families. With therapists available to meet 24/7 at any location, the MDFT program follows an intensive treatment schedule over a period of 4-6 months. HYPE, a subprogram of MDFT, connects with youth aged 16-21 and is now expanding to offer support to transition-age youth (16-24) and to caregivers managing their recovery while parenting children ages 5 and under. UCFS Director of Substance Use Services, Michelle Melendez, says what makes MDFT stand apart is its holistic approach that seeks to enrich family functionality and communication. "MDFT directly works to help the

health and well-being of not only the adolescent, young adult, or adult that is directly in need of substance use treatment, but looks to impact how the family interacts and functions as a whole."



24/7/365 MOBILE CRISIS INTERVENTION SERVICES

When a child experiences a mental or behavioral health crisis, it is not always during standard business hours. This is why, in 2023, we were excited to transition our Mobile Crisis Intervention Services (MCIS) to offer 24/7/365 support. While around-the-clock phone support had always been available, additional services, such as access to clinicians, could only happen during



set hours. UCFS Program
Manager Emily Morse said
that additional access to MCIS
resources was greatly needed,
and the expansion has already
proven to be a great benefit
because, in her words, "crises
don't happen on schedule."
In the first six months of the

expanded 24/7/365 access, MCIS received 50 crisis calls during what had previously been considered "off hours." The expanded access is also routinely being utilized by local police departments in the late evenings and early mornings, better connecting youth in crises to a trained behavioral health clinician who will be there in person in less than 45 minutes.

COORDINATED CHRONIC CARE MANAGEMENT

It has only been two years since we launched our Chronic Care Coordination Program, and it is already growing. To support this expansion, UCFS partnered with TimeDoc Health, which offers tech enabled services for virtual care management. UCFS COO, Cara Westcott, said that this partnership has really helped UCFS build the Chronic Care Coordination Program's capacity and increase its reach to about 200 chronic care patients to date. The Chronic Care Coordination Program addresses the needs of patients with chronic conditions that require specialized care coordination between visits such as developing plans for diet, exercise, and medication. However, this program offers much more than support for patients' medical needs. It also fulfills critical needs in the lives of our patients by connecting them to essential resources. One amazing example of coordination of resources occurred when UCFS arranged transportation for a patient with severe asthma and COPD who was affected by poor air quality created by the Canadian wildfires. Our efforts allowed



them to get to and from the pharmacy without being exposed to the smoke.

GREATER COMMUNITY OUTREACH

This year, UCFS expanded our community outreach presence by placing Madonna Place, a model that proved successful with Otis Library, Norwich Adult Education, and New London Adult Education. We

became an anchor site for the Eastern Connecticut Health Collaborative Mobile Health Hubs by providing community outreach staff at locations that include Norwich, Preston, and Colchester. These partnerships support our Community Outreach Services team to connect people in the communities we serve to our services and assist them with health insurance applications, health literacy, medical care coordination for children with complex needs, housing, transportation, and food. For example, UCFS arranged for farmers' market vouchers for the family of a 13-year-old patient with iron deficiency to improve their access to fresh fruits and vegetables, and provided them a gas card to help them attend hematology appointments. Supervisor of Community Outreach, Norma Glover, said

that outreach efforts are essential to people who need support but are unable or unwilling to reach out to UCFS themselves, adding, "We want to make sure we meet community members where they're most comfortable."



MEETING ELDERCARE NEEDS

More than ever, there is room for our at risk seniors at Sheltering Arms, a residential care home for seniors aged 60 and older. We support the state and national goals of transitioning clients from nursing homes to more independent living. When asked to describe the UCFS philosophy around this initiative, VP of Eldercare Services Cary Trantalis succinctly shares, "We're here to support clients and their families as they navigate each challenge to ensure independence. One resident who left a nursing home now manages her own finances, doctor's appointments, and social visits with loved ones. It's



possible for shortterm skilled nursing care to be just that, short-term when there are options like Sheltering Arms." **66** UCFS constantly looks for new ways to bring healthcare and social support to the communities we serve, giving life to our mission to eliminate health disparities. This year, we've made behavioral health more accessible, improved chronic care coordination, expanded community outreach, and welcomed more senior citizens into our residential care home. Over 20,000 people are leading healthier lives as a result. ??
